Help shop for birthday gifts for 60 ASC kids with June birthdays!


Shopping is of no cost to you. We ask you to donate your time and talents to shop for birthday gifts for the boys and girls who have lost a military parent and have a birthday in June.

Literacy and Education Committee

The Mamie Eisenhower Library Project (MELP) is the NFRW's oldest program, celebrating 60 years of book donations from an approved list to schools, libraries, hospitals and other public institutions.


In 1961, the NFRW established the Mamie Eisenhower Library Project as a memorial honoring the former Republican First Lady who served for decades as a military wife and prepared the family home for over 30 moves during President Eisenhower's military service to our country. Born in Iowa and moving to the South as a child, Mrs. Eisenhower was active in financial decisions in her home and often said that a woman's independence was based upon her own ability to save money. She practiced fiscal responsibility as a First Lady, often clipping recipes for the White House Chef to prepare using boxed cake mixes as they were cheaper than baking from scratch.

Each biennium, the NFRW Literacy and Education Committee compiles a list of books that reflect Republican conservative beliefs of self-reliance, freedom and independence. In 1992, tapes and videos were added to the list. In 2020, DVDs and streaming services were added to the list. These books, both adult and children's levels, are intended to be donated to public libraries, all schools, and hospitals to provide reading material to a wide variety of children and adults in our communities. During the COVID-19 pandemic, many clubs expanded to reading children's books online through social media to a nation's children not able to enter school buildings.

Possessing the ability to read and write is fundamental. It makes learning possible, inevitable and infinite. For this reason, fostering literacy has long been a priority of the National Federation of Republican Women, and several literacy programs have been developed to achieve this goal.

Over the past 60 years, the NFRW and its members have donated thousands of books each year to libraries, schools, hospitals and other public institutions through our <u>Mamie Eisenhower Library Project</u> (MELP). Since 2002, Federation members have donated more than 300,000 dictionaries to school children through the <u>Dictionary Project</u>.

The Red Shoe Book Club is a way for local clubs to explore and discuss books, and publish book reviews in monthly newsletters and on club websites. To form a Red Shoe Book Club, participants should designate a time and place and select books from the MELP lists to read, discuss and share. Related materials, including the Red Shoe Book Club logo (which can be used on club promotional materials), are available in the Member Center Digital Resource Library.

Dorothy's red shoes were not the reason we initiated the Red Shoe Book Club on the literacy programs web page. It was established to encourage clubs to form a Red Shoe Book Club, which would give its members the opportunity to read, discuss and share a book each month. What was missing was a logo.

Red Shoe Book Club members can chose a book from the MELP book list, a personal favorite, or a children's book that has special meaning. Many clubs have a book club where members get together once a month, usually at a member's home, to have a cup of coffee or tea, and discuss a book that truly comes alive when shared with others.
